Branding Refresh! We have been working hard on our brand "refresh" and are excited to launch our new name and new and improved website in January! Stay tuned!





A MESSAGE FROM EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR, ANDY JOHNSON:



Dear Families and Staff of the Sage International Network of Schools,

At the midpoint of the school year and the end of 2022, I am inclined to be reflective and think about where we are as International Baccalaureate World Schools and to be grateful for such strong and supportive communities around our schools.

I am happy to report that nearly 2/3s of the Senior Class of 2023 - the class which started as kindergarteners during Sage Boise's first year of operation - are full <u>Diploma</u> <u>Programme (DP)</u> or <u>Career-related Programme (CP)</u> candidates. I believe that most people can manage either program with the right support and with determination and persistence - support and encouragement they get at Sage Schools.

Our Seniors represent, every year, the support, encouragement and thousands of opportunities they had to learn and grow during their (potentially) thirteen years in IB programs at a Sage school. They should be ready by the time they are 11th Graders to take on the challenges and rewards of learning deeply, stretching themselves and doing hard things with the people around them.

The benefits of participating fully in the IB are legion. Yes, the CP and DP are excellent preparation for post-secondary educational options such as colleges and universities. People who participate in the DP or CP are more likely to persist at college and more likely to graduate within five years. Additionally, more and more universities and colleges are offering credit for IB courses. These credits vary by university or college and can add up to thousands and thousands of dollars in savings and more freedom to pursue courses that are of higher and more immediate interest than entry-level Freshman courses.

Another benefit that I want to point out and is rarely highlighted is the joy of doing hard things with people you care about. Sage's DP and CP students immediately have something in common with each other and with any other DP or CP student they meet on their new campus. They can laugh (or commiserate) about oral exams in French, designing an experiment for their Biology Internal Assessment (IA), perhaps argue whether or not the Araby chapter in Joyce's Dubliners is the basis for the wonderful Irish film Sing Street (seriously, watch it!) or be happy they don't have to take first year calculus because they did HL math.

I encourage you to read more about what research says about the IB's programs <u>here</u>. I also encourage you to speak directly to your child's teachers, their division director or program coordinator if you want to learn more.

During the month of December, we celebrate being communicators. We focus on this IB learner profile by modeling and teaching students how to express themselves confidently and creatively in more than one language and in many ways. We guide them to collaborate effectively and

listen carefully to the perspectives of other individuals and groups. This leads to confidence and independence by doing things on their own and having the courage to take risks.

How can parents help to develop students who are Communicators at home?

- 1. Take turns speaking and listening to one another about your daily events.
- 2. Explore other forms of communication including symbols, signs, and sounds.
- 3. Read a variety of texts and find connections between the books and your child's life.
- 4. Discuss the TV programs and videos you watch together.
- 5. Make books, magazines, and other reading material readily available.
- 6. Take time to listen to your child when he/she talks with you, by turning off technology and providing undivided attention.
- 7. Ask questions about what they are saying, ask for explanations.
- 8. Act out stories, plays, poems, use language in fun creative ways.
- 9. Sing together.
- 10. Support other forms of communication via art, dance, music etc.

ENROLLMENT NEWS

Each year we require you to re-enroll your student for the upcoming school year. While we always guarantee current students a seat, this allows us to plan for our lottery and how many openings we will have

available for each grade level in the coming year. This is also an opportunity to review the contact information we have on record for your family.

This year **re-enrollment will be open from January 30th through February 12th**. At that time, you will also have the opportunity to apply for the sibling lottery for any <u>additional</u> students you would like to enroll. Siblings that live within the same household are given priority in our enrollment lottery for any openings that we have available.

Our 2023-24 lottery application for families who are NEW to Sage schools is open for both campuses January 2nd - February 23rd, and you will see information about it posted on our social media and website. You <u>do not need to apply to that lottery</u>. You will re-enroll any current students and add any siblings to the lottery starting January 30th. Here are the third units for our PYP students this year: Kinder- How We Express Ourselves: People learn from sharing experiences Grade 1- How We Organize Ourselves: Communities share resources Grade 2- Who We Are: People choose behaviors that develop personal values Grade 3- Where We Are In Place and Time: History informs the present Grade 4- (combined) Sharing the Planet and How the World Works Grade 5- Who We Are: Perspective influences interpretations

Ask your student about what they are learning about in their Unit of Inquiry!

A NOTE FROM NURSE BLEW:

Cold Weather and Viral Infections

Some viruses thrive in cold dry weather, while others prefer warmer weather. Most cold weather viruses are spread primarily through respiratory droplets from coughing, sneezing, and talking.

It is well known that being in close contact in crowded rooms increases the risk of transmission of almost all viruses and bacterial infections (such as Strep Throat). For this reason, it is beneficial to have kids play outside as much as possible. However, it has been found that dry air below 20 degrees can affect the tracheal and nasal mucociliary beat frequency, decreasing the body's ability to keep viruses out. For this reason, we will be having indoor recess when temperatures reach that point.

Please be sure that your child has a water-propellant coat, gloves, and boots. A hat is also important in preventing earaches, and heat loss through the head. For the young kids that like to splash in water puddles, please send extra pants and socks. If your family is unable to provide these items, please let myself or Counselor Joy know. We can (confidentially) see if we can find resources for donations of these items.

The "Tripledemic" of 2022 refers to a large number of cases of Covid-19, RSV, and Influenza. Here is a description of each and the plan for returning to school:

Covid-19 symptoms: Fever/chills, Cough, difficulty breathing, fatigue, body aches, headache, sore throat, runny nose/congestion, nausea/vomiting, diarrhea, loss of taste/smell.

Return to school: With Covid, we ask that students stay home for 5 full days from the onset of symptoms. May return on day 6 wearing a mask until after day 10 if symptoms are improving.

RSV (Respiratory Syncytial Virus) symptoms: Fever/chills (usually over 102 degrees in young children), cough, rapid breathing, sore throat, runny nose/congestion, ear infection. More severe in children under 2 y/o.

Influenza (Flu) symptoms: Sudden onset of fever (102-104 degrees), chills, headache, body aches, sore throat, cough, runny nose/congestion, mild pink eye, fatigue. Occasionally tummy pain with/without vomiting.

Return to school: For these and any other illnesses, we ask that students stay home until vomiting/diarrhea free for 24 hours, fever-free for 24 hours (without meds like Tylenol or Ibuprofen) and other symptoms are improving.

Here's an article to help: "<u>How to know when your child is too sick for school</u>". In order to keep our staff and students healthy, we really need your help to keep students home when sick! Thank you, and we wish you and your family a healthy New Year!


